

Who can get help to die?

There are rules for voluntary assisted dying.



Not everyone can get help to die.




You can only get help to die if you

• have a sickness that will **not** stop



• feel lots of pain from the sickness



are likely to die in the next 6 months
 or 1 year for some sicknesses



are 18 years or older



live in Victoria



• are able to make your own choices.

Who cannot get help to die?

You **cannot** get voluntary assisted dying if you

• have a mental illness only

have a disability only

• cannot make your own choices.







What is the service?



The service will answer questions about voluntary assisted dying.



Anyone can contact the service.



The service can tell you

how voluntary assisted dying works



who can help you



how to find the right doctors



• how to get the support you need.



The service might also help you pay for travel costs to see a doctor.

Who are the people at the service?



The people at the service are called care navigators.

A care navigator is a health professional who is trained to help dying people.

For example, a nurse.



A care navigator can also help the family and friends of a dying person.



You always have the right to make your own choices.



You can decide **not** to get help to die after you talk to a care navigator.
